PATIENCE

'April Showers bring May Flowers'' . . . not sure who came up with that catchy little saying, just like I am not sure exactly what the month of May is going to bring to us (other than perhaps May flowers). Here is what I do know . . . our patience will continue to be tested. We are used to having things when we want them, the way we want them, and as much as we want them. We are tired of being told we can't go here or there and we can't do this or that. I get it. There are so many things I miss doing and want to do; not the least of which is being able to worship together as a church family, see people I have not seen in nearly two months, and be uplifted by the energy of fellowship.

However, we can't expect to have a life that is easy and comfortable every day just because we are Christians. We must patiently endure hardships, heartaches, and even some temporary inconveniences; in doing so, we develop patience.

A woman sees a father shopping with a fussy two-year-old in his grocery cart. "Be patient, Billy," he whispers. "You can handle this, Billy. It's okay, Billy."

The woman said to him, "I don't mean to interrupt your shopping, but I just had to tell you how wonderfully loving and patient you are with little Billy."

The man replied, "Actually, my son's name is Patrick. My name is Billy."

James writes about patience in James 5:7-12. In that passage James describes a familiar scene using a simple but practical example of the farmer to help us better grasp "patience". The hard working farmer can prepare the soil, plant the seed and keep the field weeded but he cannot make his crop grow. Still, what was planted is worth waiting for.

To emphasize the farmer's helplessness and his need for patient dependence on God, James points out that the farmer must wait for the early and late rains. The weather is completely beyond the farmer's control. Rain is needed to get the crop to come up and grow. Too much rain causes disease or the crop to rot, and too much sun can burn it up. The weather helps the farmer develop patience, like trials help believers develop patience.

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James goes on to remind his readers of the perseverance shown by the prophets who often had to suffer while serving as God's ambassadors; as well as highlight the blessings that come to those who do exert patience and place their trust in God by using Job's suffering and eventual reward as a powerful example of patience in times of great suffering and difficult times.

All blessings come from God's goodness and without God's mercy and compassion toward us we would be at Satan's pleasure. The challenges and difficulties of life can tax us to the very limits of our strength, making it easy to give up.

The endurance of Job under severe trial is legendary. Circumstances were against him; God permitted the devil to cause the loss of his wealth, his health, and his beloved children. Job's wife told him to "Curse God and die!" (Job 2:9). Even his friends accused him of some terrible hidden sin, deserving the judgment of God.

However, in Job's example, we find encouragement and the power to persevere in life's darkest hours . . . power rooted in God, who is compassionate and merciful. Even, when life is painful and hard, we can persevere because God is there. CONSIDER THIS:

If there is nothing to endure we cannot learn patience.

We cannot persevere unless there are trials in our life.

There can be no victories without battles.

There can be no peaks without valleys.

There can be no joys without sorrows.

There can be no blessings without sufferings.

If we want the blessing, we must be prepared to carry the burden and fight life's battles.

God first humbled righteous Job then He honored him with blessings.

Like the farmer, we look ahead with hope and patiently wait; like the prophets, we do God's will and in spite of strong opposition, we stay the course; and like Job, we don't let life's circumstances cause us to change who we are or in whom we place our trust. All are rewarded for their patience.

David wrote in Psalm 40:1-3, "I waited patiently for the Lord; he turned to me and heard my cry. He lifted me out of the slimy pit, out of the mud and mire; he set my feet on a rock and gave me a firm place to stand. He put a new song in my mouth, a hymn of praise to our God. Many will see and fear and put their trust in the Lord."

In the coming month, let us each hold strong to the hope found only in God and let us put our trust in His compassion and mercy. Better days are ahead, in this life and in the life to come.
